Samuel Dewitt Proctor Conference Travel Fund

Yale Divinity School students are eager to meet humanity's challenges head-on. Embracing the future, our next generation of leaders seek learning opportunities that sometimes take them far from New Haven.

The Samuel Dewitt Proctor Conference is one of the country's leading conferences for primarily Black clergy, lay leaders, seminarians, and thought leaders committed to social justice. Over the years, there has been increasing YDS student interest in traveling to the gathering, which takes place in cities of historic significance to the civil rights movement and Black culture.

This year YDS was able to cover the costs of all 14 students who applied to attend the conference in Chicago. They will be joined by the Rev. Joanne Jennings, who leads Black Church Studies at YDS, and Lynn Sullivan-Harmon, our Associate Dean for Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging.

In addition to its learning value to current students, the Proctor Conference has become a key site for recruiting future students to Yale Divinity School. Admissions staff and student ambassadors do this vital work in the exhibitor space and as they interact with attendees during the conference meetings, luncheons, and keynote speaker events.

Until very recently, students who wanted to attend the Proctor Conference needed to make a special request to the Dean for registration and travel expenses. Lobbying for these funds was usually done through the active leadership of the Yale Black Seminarians, now celebrating its 55th anniversary. This year the new Center for Public Theology and Public Policy has also provided supplemental funding. Looking forward, we believe a recurring educational and networking opportunity of this importance deserves a larger and more stable funding stream.

We are seeking gifts to endow a fund in the amount of \$150,000 to provide grants for students to travel to the annual conference. These funds are primarily intended for students interested in serving African American churches and other Christian communities throughout the African Diaspora.

Because we wish for our students to pursue their educational opportunities without financial worry or distractions, we ask for your support for the Samuel Dewitt Proctor Conference Travel Fund. By ensuring that our students have the resources they need to commit fully to study and service, they can set their paths based on calling, not financial constraints.

This initiative has great potential for collaboration and synergy with other Inclusive Excellence Program Funds as part of our We Are Called campaign. These include Black Church Studies, Prison Ministry, Social Justice Internships, and the Inclusion and Belonging Community Impact Fund.
