Social Justice Research and Internships

At YDS, students are eager to meet humanity's challenges head-on. Whether working toward racial justice, immigrant care, improved mental health outcomes, educational opportunities, or housing solutions for all, the next generation of leaders embraces the daunting future.

For students exploring service through nonprofit organizations, our **Social Justice Internship Program** provides crucial training and the financial support of a stipend. The summer or semester internship experience—where theological reflection and the practices of work intersect—is one of the most direct ways we prepare students to positively change the world.

Our internship program is led by Alison Cunningham '84 M.Div., the Director of Professional Formation. Before returning to Yale, Alison was CEO of Columbus House in New Haven and was recognized as one of the foremost advocates for people experiencing homelessness in Connecticut. As part of the Office of Vocation and Leadership, she is the primary contact for students interested in internships set in the nonprofit world.

YDS internships contain three essential components: site-associated practice, a practicum with peer reflection, and a qualified supervisor and mentor. Whether working with Alison from a list of social justice

Many students emerge from their internships with greater clarity and a sense of calling to work toward justice in this way. Through the social justice internship program, YDS is equipping its students to minister to the needs of a suffering world.

In turn, YDS students provide New Haven's vital nonprofits with creative energy, knowledge, and passion. Here at home and beyond, interns serve in case management roles, as points of entry for new clients, as leaders of group work, as development and communications associates, and much more. Some transition into career roles with the same nonprofits after graduation. All experience real-world issues and challenges that will help them discern their future paths and strengthen them in their work.

Because we wish for our students to pursue their chosen internships without financial worry or distractions from part-time employment, we are fundraising for a goal of \$500,000 to support the Social Justice Internship Program. By ensuring that our students have the resources they need to commit fully to study and service, we free them they to set their paths based on calling, not financial constraints.

Additionally, Yale Divinity School has recently launched a competitive fund to support student research on social justice issues in New Haven and beyond. This fund will facilitate partnerships with faculty and students in Yale's other professional schools and support justice-related research that is, as well as research engaged in justice work in creative and interdisciplinary ways.
